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Social & Behavioral Studies (SBS)

SBS are integrated in all RHSP work in different ways:

- Randomized trial designs (initial and continuous)
- Interpreting quantitative analyses (less men in services)
- Designing and improving HIV prevention and care services
- Program message development (MMC trial)
- Answering other stand alone questions (life transition among adolescents)

Qualitative Research (QR) Key Questions

QR explores people's perceptions, opinions, beliefs and attitudes

- How do people behave?

- Why do they behave the way they do?



Social & Behavioral (SB) Studies

Qualitative Research methods (major)

In-depth Interviews (one-on-one)



Focus Group Discussions (8-10 people)





Observations

(e.g. in a bar to observe sex-workers' behaviors)



Salient Lessons from the Different Voluntary Medical Male Circumcision (VMMC) Studies

Barriers

- Male infertility
- Change of religion
- Pain (esp. after surgery)
- Long sex resumption period/sex abstinence
- Female partner influence
- Time off work

Facilitators

- HIV/STI prevention
- Improved penile hygiene
- HIV Testing Services (HTS)
- Female partner influence
- Male sexual prowess
- Male & female sexual pleasure



Salient Lessons from the Different HIV Care Studies

Barriers:

- Stigma
- Fear to disclose HIV+ status
- Lack of partner support
- High transport costs
- Negative side effects
- Long travel and waiting times
- Inadequate staff respect for patients

Targeted interventions:

- Couple counselling intensified
- Health education programs
- Decentralising ART provision/Outreach
- Patient-friendly and flexible clinic service hours.
